A letter of regret was read from Commander-in-Chief Woerner of California and placed on file.

A letter was read from the Department of Iowa requesting to be dropped from the Central Region Conference inasmuch no one attends from Iowa as they have lost interest.

The report of the Regional Treasurer was read and accepted. The balance in the treasury is \$248.03. It was moved by Earl Corbin, seconded by Eva Blackman that the report be accepted as read and the books turned over to the Auditing Committee.

The Conference Theme was THE FLAG.

Brother Lock announced the names of the Chairmen re the roundtable discussion groups as follows:

Delegates were divided to meet with their chairmen of the various groups and told to return in three quarters of an hour.

The meeting reconvened and the first discussion Chairman to report was Hazel Moushey, speaking for Harry Beasy, on CITIZENS OBLIGATION TO THE FLAG.

She stated: We should teach the children respect to the flag and proper ways to display it.

Encourage the pledge of allegiance to the flag in all schools.

The flag must be displayed always with the blue field on top. In case of the death of an of ficial the flag should be raised to the top of the pole and then lowered to half mast.

When there is no rostrum, the flag is displayed on the left. When there is a rostrum it is displayed on the right.

In a parage the American flag is always on the right.

It can be displayed against a wall, with the blue field always to the top and the left. It must be displayed above and behind any speaker. The flag is never dipped to any living person or sacred object.

The American flag may be cleaned but never washed and when disposed of, it must be burned.

Margaret Beasey, Chairman of HISTORY OF THE FLAG reported as follows:

In all of the history of the world, someone at last felt they must have a flag.

The cave men's symbol of a flag was made out of the hides of animals. In 1003 A.D. the story goes that Lief Erickson landed on Nova Scotia and he was carrying a banner that was white with an emblem of a bird, known as a Viking Flag.

October 12, 1492 Columbus had a flag with a cross on each corner and the crown of the queen in the center.

1620 - the Pilgrims flag - St. George's Red Cross and White Cross of Scotland.

1754 Washington led troops under the English Flag, hoping to appease England.

The Dutch Flag had nine red and white stripes and was called the Sons of Liberty Flag.

The Cambridge Flag with thirteen alternate red and white stripes with the combined Cross of St. Andrew and St. George in the canton was raised by George Washington at Cambridge, Mass. January 2, 1776.

One of the first Stars and Stripes was flown under General Stark in Aug. 1777 near Bennington, Vermont. All that remains in the canton was th thirteen stars.

The Flag with fifteen stars and stripes was approved by President Washington, Jan. 17, 1794 - a star and stripe for each state. The growth of the Union was unforeseen at the time and on December 9, 1816, a resolution was offered to change the Flag.

April 1818 the act passed changing the Flag to thirt en horizontal stripes alternate red and white and tw nty white stars in a blu field. The Flag with the thirteen stripes and a star added for every new state was completed August 21, 1959 with a total of 50 stars. Lik a child, a

Flag is born out of love - love of country - and becom s dearer for the many and great sacrifices made for it. Long may it wave!

Thomas L. W. Johnson, Chairman of COURTESY TO THE FLAG reported as follows:

We don't understand all we know about the subject. There are times when we are unsure of patriotism. We mean to do well; we mean no disrespect; when someone tells us to do something, we carry it out, only to find that someone else read a different book. This also relates to politics, law and religion. This is life.

How can courtesy to the flag be shown? Parade spectators should show respect for the flag by saluting it when carried in parades. Men in uniform - particularly local law enforcement officials - should be alerted to set the example. Boy Scout troops will often set the example for their elders.

How can we best get information to the public? Distribute place mats depicting correct usage to better restaurants in the community for use around patriotic holidays. Charles Brady volunteered a sample print by the Sutherland Paper Company of Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Where are flags displayed? On buildings, flag poles, marching units, etc. It is very important that the flag be displayed on Memorial Day. How many of you display the flag on this important day, and salute the flag voluntarily? Again we are all well meaning.

Sponsor school assemblies particularly in the grade and junior high schools to explain correct flag usage. Get the message across before the pupil becomes a potential drop-out.

Discourage the use of the flag as a plaything among children. Discourage blatently commercial uses of the flag where no patriotic purpose will be served.

Encourage our law makers to give serious consideration to legislation that would make it unlawful to desecrate the flag in any way. People are well meaning, but we must install in them respect and courtesy to the FLAG.

APATHY OF THE FLAG was reported by Roderick Van Trump as follows: Set the example - and fly the flag yourself - your neighbor will follow suit.

Another way of getting at this thing is thru the newspapers. Every tim they go around taking pictures of some office, plant or company flying the flag, it gives them free publicity. In this way they will want to display the flag.

The Chicago Tribune has a colored flag in the upper left hand corner of their paper. They at least remind the people that we have a flag. Ask other newspapers to do the same.

The Department of Illinois passed a resolution at their Department Encampment to try to pass some kind of law whereby it makes it a fed ral offense to be disrespectful to the flag. There should also be a law as to mistreatment of the flag, outlining the penalty for such an act. Each of the Departments could take this subject back to their Departments and have their Auxiliaries and Camps pass resolutions and write to their representatives and senators demanding that a law be passed to punish anyone who is disrespectful to the flag.

Then the annual placing of flags on the soldiers graves on Memorial Day. Two or three only show up to do the job to place these flags. And last but not least - it is very disrespectful that the flag is not saluted.

After a discussion of the above mentioned topics, it was moved by Roderick Van Trump, seconded by Eva Blackman that we as individual families display the flag for the coming year and make a report at the next meeting as to its effect on the citizenery. Carried.

We were honored to have Brother George Cashman give us a reading on WHAT IS A FLAG.

After several announcements, the meeting recessed at 4:30 P. M. to reconvene at 9 A. M. Sunday morning.

Saturday evening at 6:30 P. M. the annual dinner was held in honor of the Regional Officers and delegates. 54 attended this dinner.

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9 A. M. Sunday morning, October 8th, the second session of the Central Region Conference was called to order by the Commander.

The invocation was given by Margret Beasey, Regional Chaplain.

The salute to the flag was given by the assembly led by Helen Brady, Regional Patriotic Instructor.

A letter was read by Roderick Van Trump from Past Commander in Chief LeRoy Stoudt of Pennsylvania, advising that "The National Grange" has received permission from the National Park Service to erect a memorial in the Gettysburg National Cemetery. It is to be a room for meditation, honoring the 100th anniversary of their organization.

After a lengthy discussion regarding the danger of setting a precedent and opening the door for the erection of countless memorials, the delegates were urged to write to their congressmen opposing this move.

Brother Cashman stated that he would be in Washington on the 20th and 21st and if it is the concensus of the group, he had friends in Washington who would be glad to speak for this group. It is moved by Brother Coffin, seconded by Brother Van Trump that Mr. Cashman speak to his friend and have him do what he could. Carried.

There as the manifuld Reland hotel has been so cooperative for our comfort during This Regional Conference.
Therefore be it resolved that the Regional Seig send them a letter of thanks. Whereas: The Committee who made The arrangements for This regional meeting and entertainment did such a nice job. Therefore be it resolved we give them a rising vote of thanks. Where us our discussion groupes have proven enstructive in the past. Therefore, be it resolved this be Continued next year,

Margaret Horn Beasey was called upn to report on the Historical Civil War Brochure. She stated that at the last meeting it was suggested that we do something this year or drop it. I had ideas of having pictures in this brochure, but wherever I went with the material on hand the printers quoted a price of \$500.00 without pictures and \$10.00 for each picture used. Inasmuch I was allowed the sum of \$125.00, for this project, it was impossible to go into printing so my only recourse was mimeographing.

The Auditing Committee reported that they audited the treasurers books and found them to be correct. Signed by Capitola Rehrmann, Hazel Moushey and Paul Grate.

Sister Edith Nile, Chairman on resolutions read the following:

Therefore be it resolved that we give them a rising vote of thanks. Whereas our National President, Flora Bates, has taken time out of her busy schedule to grace our Regional Meeting, with her presents, Therefore be it resolved that we extend to her our thanks by a round of applause.

Whereas James L. High, Jr. Vice Commander in Chief who so ably represented our Commander in Chief Brother Frank Woerner of California, Therefore be it resolved that we extend to him our thanks.

Whereas Past National President, Ellinore L. Konrad, has so graciously taken over the duties of our Regional Secretary, Betty Johnson, who is very ill, Therefore be it resolved we give her a rising vote of thanks.

It was moved by Brother Coffin, seconded by Herman Black that these courtesy resolutions be adopted. Carried.

Past Department Commander, Thomas L. W. Johnson of Wisconsin, submitted the following resolution:

Whereas the discussions relating to the Flag were instructive and inspirational for those attending the Central Region Conference, and Whereas, it is important that the youth of our country be imbued with knowledge and respect for our Flag,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Central Region Conference allow

the sum of \$15.00 annually to be presented to the host Department - Sons and Auxiliary - with the understanding that a Flag will be purchased and awarded to a recognized youth group within the State.

This resolution was approved by the committee and adopted.

The report of the Nominating Committee was given by the Chairman, Thomas L. W. Johnson and the following were recommended:

It was moved by Eva Blackman, seconded by Herman Black that we accept the recommended officers for the ensuing year. Carried.

Capitola Rehrmann reported on the mimoegraphed pamphlet given out at the Decatur observance, the birthplace of the G. A. R. She said she was fortunate to receive the information from every department except Nebraska. The cost was \$87.00 for 500 copies. Before the April observance she sent 35 copies each to the Departments who contributed. Brother Jim High stated he would pay for 200 copies personally. The sum of \$8.00 was turned over to the treasurer. Capitola thanked all the Departments who had a part in it.

Capitola Rehrmann was given a rising vote of thanks.

The Regional Guide then escorted the National President of the Auxiliary, Sister Flora Bates of Massachusetts, to the rostrum. She told the delegates she was very happy to be in attendance and stated the meeting has been very inspirational. She also stated the East has a New England Regional Association and they are very active. They meet three times a year - March, October and July. The Association presents a sword to a young cadet in the Military Academy in New London, Connecticut.

This was her first official visit after returning home from National.

Brother James High, Jr. Vice Commander in Chief brought the greetings from the Commander in Chief, Brother Frank Woerner and extended his regrets because of another commitment.

Bills were read. It was moved by Hazel Moushey, seconded by Charles Brady that all bills be paid. Carried.

Margaret Beasey extended an invitation to the Conference to meet in Lafayette, Indiana in 1967. It was mov d by Broth r Coffin, s conded by Brother Corbin that we meet in Lafayette. Carried.

The Regional Treasurer reported the balance of \$149.04 in our Treasury.

The sum of \$10.00 was turned over to the Department of Ohio and this sum is to be given to the Crippled Children's Center.

Margaret Beasey reported that the Department Commander of Indiana, Tom Lock designed a Banner which was on display in the meeting room. Brother Lock then told the delegates what hathe Banner stood for.

There was a discussion with regard to having an Altar and opened Bible at future meetings. A vote was taken and the outcome was 21 for and 17 opposed. We will have an open Bible at our meetings.

Dora Johnston, the newly elected Regional Commander was escorted to the Rostrum. She thanked the delegates and told them she would do her best.

The theme selected for the coming year is: PREPARING OUR YOUTH FOR RESPONSIBLE CITIZENSHIP. Chairman, Charles Brady, Jr.

Brother Coffin then made a few remarks regarding the Regional Conference - and what an inspiration these meetings have been.

It was moved by Eva Blackman, seconded by Hazel Moushey, that we adjourn. Carried.

The meeting closed with prayer by our newly elected Chaplain, Capitola Rehrmann, followed by the singing of "God Be With You 'Til We Meet Again". 11:00 A. M.

Margaret Horn Beasey was called upon to give her report on the Historical Civil War Brochure. She stated she wrote to the Chairmen of all the Departments in the Central Region who were not present at the last meeting. Minnesota wrote and said they were broke, could barely pay their dues and were unable to help with the brochure. Several other states wrote and told her they wanted to take the matter up at their Department Encampments. Dora Johnston of Michigan stated the Auxiliary members raised \$50.00 and would raise more if the Central R gion would go thru with this project. Anita Selby of Ohio stated she felt we really could not afford this brochure. Right now we do not have the finances to make a successful project. It is wonderful if it could be done; howev r, Ohio will do their share.

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Margaret reminded the Conference that the material for each State was to have been sent her on or before December 31, 1964. Those who responded were: Thomas L. W. Johnson of Wisconsin; Tom Lock of Indiana and Charles Brady of Illinois.

Roderick Van Trump had an idea. He thought that the Sun Times in Chicago would print them for \$1.00 a piece. He would check into it. After a lengthy discussion it was suggested that Margaret contact one more printer and Mr. Van Trump would try to get information to her with regard to the Sun Times in Chicago.

Roderick Van Trump read the following letter from his Department Commander, who was unable to be present; regarding the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the GAR, Decatur, Illinois.

Commemoration of the establishing of Post #1 will be held April 16, 17, 1966 in Decatur following the Lincoln Tomb ceremony on April 15 in Springfield Illinois.

- 1. Ceremonies at the grave site of Major Benjamin Franklin Stephenson, father of the GAR.
- 2. Ceremonies at the original site of Post #1.
- 3. Reenactment of the chartering of Post #1.
- 4. Allied orders to set-up booths, representing various GAR posts and register descendants of GAR members.
- 5. Displays of original GAR equipment, papers uniforms, and some of the effects of Major Stephenson.
- 6. Millikan University to present pageant, depicting the history of the GAR.
- 7. GAR Commemorative postage stamp, 1st day issue. Ceremony to be held in Decatur, Illinois. (Write your representatives or the Postmaster General urging them to act on the issuance of this stamp).
- 8. Torch light parade, including all Department representatives and descendants of GAR members. (Parade will terminate in Decatur's Central Park at which time Governor Kerner will deliver an address.
- 9. State of Illinois Historymobile will be present.
- 10. A. All allied orders to contact local newspapers, re: articles or series of articles concerning GAR Posts that were located in their cities or counties.

- B. Set up displays of GAR equipment, papers, uniforms etc. in areas where Posts were located (Jan. 1966 April 1966).
- C. Plan commemorative ceremony for April 6 at all local GAR monuments, old GAR Halls or Civil War monuments.
- 11. NBC-TV coverage during ceremonies at Decatur.
- 12. NBC interested in doing a film documentary on the story of the GAR early in 1966.

To date the Illinois Department has secured the cooperation of the Decatur Chamber of Commerce, the Macon County Historical Society, Decatur Civil War Round Table and the Decatur Herald Review. Governor Kerner has proclaimed 1966 as the GAR year. At this time, the Department of Illinois, wishes to extend a sincere welcome to all other Departments to participate in this Grand patriotic commemoration of the founding of the Grand Army of the Republic."

The Conference reconvened and the first discussion Chairman to report was Thomas L. W. Johnson on: HOW CAN WE MAKE THE PUBLIC AWARE OF THE G.A.R. CENTENNIAL?

He brought out five points:

- 1. Newspaper publicity
- 2. Radio and T.V.
- 3. Library and museum displays
- 4. Flag pr sentations
- Essay contests and scholarship awards.

He stat d that if w could get at least one of these ideas accomplished, that would be an accomplishment in itself.

It is almost impossible to make the kpublic aware of what the letters GAR stand for. Unfortunately GAR does not have the significance today as it had 30 to 40 years ago.

The best source of publicity are our newspapers. Attempt to obtain publicity thru news papers, public news media, radio and T.V.

Have the newspapers come up with a story of a local post. This will stimulate local interest. Bring into the picture local personaliti s such as the first commander of the local jpost. Provide biographical sketches - contact the library board or chief librarian.

Departments and Camps put some stress on school systems. Have them obtain assembly speakers who would give them an account of the aims and accomplishments of the GAR.

National, Department and local sponsorship of awards of some nature - such as Essay contest and scholarship award, but do not restrict it to only decendants of the GAR

Stimulate some thought as to how to get across the meaning of these letters - G. A. R. in the next few months when the Grand Army celebrates its 100th anniversary.

A general discussion followed. Illinois reported giving \$150.00 as a scholarship each year. They also give a sabre.

Wisconsin presents a plaque each year.

Commander in Chief Corbin stated the National Organization gives the sum of \$250.00 to a worthy student as a scholarship each year.

Meeting recessed at 4:30 P. M.

6:00 P. M. Saturday evening an informal dinner was held in honor of the Regional Officers and delegates. The Chairman of this Conference, Urion Mackey, presided at this dinner. The speak of the evening was Rev. Frank R. Hollingsworth of the First Park Congregational Church. Brother Mackey gave a "Flag Oration" that was enjoyed by all. The soloist was Mrs. Mildred B. Moseley. A delightful meal was enjoyed by all.

Sunday morning, October 10th, 1965, at 9:25 G. M. the second session of the Central Region Conference was called to order by Regional Commander, Possie Goodermont.

The invocation was given by acting Chaplain, Margaret Horn Beasey.

anita Selby, Patriotic Instructor, again led the assembly in the salute to the flag.

Roderick Vam Irump reported on How Can We Get The Aublic To Share In The G.A.R. Centennial?

He stated that Jom Johnson's study group covered about everything. He presented it so well that this man be a repitition.

Every effort should be made to enlighten the news media that the G.A.R. has been in existence for 100 years. Ceremonies should be planned in G.A.R. Halls, have parades. Work with the newspapers, State Historical Societies. There may be ways in which their services could be utilized. Invite children's groups, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts to commemorate the G.A.R. in parades, etc. Schools and Civic Groups Buildings might display the American flag on the 100th Amniversary of the G.A.R. Encourane local historical societies to display their own G.A.R. relics. Have an essay or oratorical contest re: the founding of the G.A.R.. These contests to be held in public schools.

anita Selbt, reported on: How can the G.G.R. Centennial Best be Observed by Individual auxiliaries, Camps and Nepartments? First bt proclamation, using newspapers, radio, etc.
Second, Nisplay G.G.R. equipment, papers, uniforms etc. in store windows Memorial buildings, etc.
Third, Plan commemorative programs and invite the public.
Fourth, Write your representative in regard to commemorative stamps.
Fifth, Auxiliaries, Camps and Nepartments should have dinners and programs observing centennial of G.R. and invite the public.
Sixth, Ohio Department Commander Frown has contacted Gov. Rhodes to proclaim 1966 G.G.K. Centennial or the founding of the G.G.R.

Oral Report of Discussion Group - Topic 4 Group Chairman's Notes

- TOPIC 4: How can the <u>Central Region</u> participate in the observance being planned for Decatur, Illinois, the birthplace of the G.A.R.?
- 1) Observance at Decatur will take place on Saturday and Sunday, April 16 and 17, 1966; Lincoln Tomb Ceremony on Friday, April 15 at Springfield, only 40 miles away. Plug attendance all 3 days; nice week-end trip.
- 2) Discussion group's idea, suggested by Chuck Brady:
 Give public the story of the G.A.R. in each of the
 Central Region states. Stories to be given at
 Decatur observance.
- 3) State stories to be prepared by each Central Region state's Department (or Auxiliary). Burden for furnishing stories placed on Departments. If a Department does not come through, its story will not be told. Considerable digging and research on part of Departments will be involved.

Topic 4 (Cont.)

- 4) Each story could start with organization of state's first G.A.R. Post and carry through to last meeting and disbandment.
- 5) Method of presenting stories to public:
 - a) Simple <u>printed</u> pamphlet, about pocket size. No art work or fancy stuff. Would cost money.

 How much? Who would pay for it Departments in the Region or Regional Treasurer? Maybe some individuals would contribute? Pamphlets would be passed out at Decatur.
 - b) Mimeograph on 8½ by 11 paper. Would be quite cheap, but not as impressive as printing. Would be passed out at Decatur.
 - c) Oral presentation at Decatur, each story to be read by a representative of the Central Regional state's Department. Stories would have to be briefer than if printed or Mimeographed. Manuscripts would still have to be submitted for review as outlined in 7) c) below. Time and place in Decatur for reading to be set by S.U.V.C.W. and local (Decatur) committees in charge of observance. Advantage of this method: No money involved. Disadvantage: Nothing permanent left.

- 6) Discussion group's choice of method: 5) a) Printing.
- 7) Regional Conference to appoint a Chairman in charge of project. Chairman would:
 - a) Write each Central Region Department and Auxiliary explaining project and requesting manuscript of state's G.A.R. story furnish by a
 certain deadline date or be left out.
 - b) Co-ordinate the project.
 - c) Submit the manuscripts to Jim Blackman (who has a wealth of G.A.R. material, both local and national) for review as to accuracy, possible additions or deletions, etc. Perhaps Brother Harold Teitelbaum of the Chicago Public Library would be willing to assist in this.
 - d) Arrange for the printing or Mimeographing if one of these methods is chosen.
- 8) Since time has a way of growing short, discussion group suggests an early start on the project.

Committee Chairmen were asked to leave their written reports with the Secretary to assist her in compiling the minutes.

The meeting reconvened and the first discussion Chairman to report was Earl Corbin on OUR PATRIOTIC HERITAGE.

Patriotism means love of Country. It exists in the heart of every American citizen. There is a lack of patriotism in schools. Our children should be taught patriotism in our schools and also by their parents. Our flag should be saluted in schools as it has been in the past. Patriotism is hard to get across to some people. We have too many isms in our Americanism today. We recommend that all of our members try to put notices in the paper and on radio as to how bystanders should respect the passing of our flag in parades, etc.

There was no discussion on this subject.

Alex Levi, Chairman of PATRIOTISM AND EDUCATION reported as follows:

Our most important duty today is Youth Guidance. Lack of saluting the flag and lack of morality comes from lack of youth guidance. We take too much for granted. The delegates present should try to get the local school boards, P.T.A. groups and legislatures to stress on the teaching of American History. Tell the school boards what to do and what not to do. We are faced with delinquency which can only be taken care of by guidance. Schools have to be watched for subversive teachings.

A lenghty discussion followed. Our Nat'l President stated that one must be very careful what you do or say to the State Board of Education. In the small communities you do not have so much trouble; it is the large cities that you are not going to be so successful. You have to be very diplomatic when dealing with these people.

Charles Brady, Jr., Chairman of PATRIOTISM AND THE PUBLIC NEWS MEDIA reported as follows:

Newspapers are our best source of publicity in the promotion of patriotism and bringing before the public our patriotic activities. Publicize activities of the Sons of Veterans Reserve or skirmish units. Publicize patriotic programs presented to the public. Publicize to save a Civil War monument. Group dinners of patriotic organizations should be publicized. Presentation of flags, medals or sabres should receive publicity. HOW DO YOU DO THESE THINGS? Go to the top man or the Editor. Radio and TV will also want to be in the know if you are holding a very noteworthy event. If local radio or paper has a local column, be sure to get it in on tim.

Work with local Historical Society. Write series of articles on Civil War. Use of a local person's name.

It helps to have uniformed people in pictures.

All noted events should be passed along to the Dept. Press Correspondent.

Following the discussion on News Media, the 2nd Wisconsin Vol. Inf. under the direction of Major Ernst A. von Frankenberg presented the colors.

Regional Commander Johnson thanked the boys and told the delegates these men devote many hours of their time, talents and efforts in the participation of ceremonies, arms demonstrations and sham battles.

It was moved by Eva Blackman seconded by Mildred Biering that the Secretary write a letter of thanks to the boys for services performed. Carried.

M eting recessed at 4:30 P. M. to reconvene at 9:00 A. M. Sunday.

Saturday evening at 6:00 P. M. a dinner was held in honor of the R gional Officers and delegates. This was very well planned by Betty Johnson, Chairlady and her committee. The speaker - Honorable John R. Moses, Director from the Department of Veterans Affairs, Madison, Wisconsin, gave a very interesting talk and the entertainment that followed was very outstanding.

Sunday morning October 11th, 1964, at 9:00 A. M. the second session of the Central Region Conference was called to order by Regional Commander, Thomas L. W. Johnson.

The invocation was given by the Regional Chaplain, Dora Johnson.

Harry Beasey, acting Patriotic Instructor, again led the assembly in the salute to the Flag.

Capitola Rehrmann, Chairman of PATRIOTISM AND GOVERNMENT reported as follows:

Register and vote is one of the most important duties - watch the polls and study the issues of the men to be elected and vote for the issues rather than the person.

We should try to pass on to our children and grandchildren the merits of these organizations in which we are interested.

Liberal writers have written books today that are slanted towards th ir personal ideas and we should stop these writers.

Impress on our representatives by letter or otherwise to lift up th morals of the government and urge them to have their appointees or assistants to do likewise.

Baring the prayer in the school was a big mistake as our country was founded on religion.

We believe that only those with the ability to act should be appointed to the Supreme Court and there should be an age limit as in our branches of service.

Voting machines should be improved so the voter would see that his vote is registered and no information should be given out by press, TV or radio as to how the vote is going until the polls are closed throughout the entire United States. We need more patriotism in the Country.

Margaret Beasey, Chairman of HISTORICAL CIVIL WAR BROCHURE reported as follows:

Write again to the chairmen or Departments who were not present. Have them signify their interest by writing to Margaret or the Secretary of the Region, and submit their articles to them.

Pictures and less reading matter would be more interesting, especially if the brochure would be used as gifts for children.

Inasmuch as Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin are represented at this Conference and have been given ideas as to what type of articles to submit, the Chairman of this committee should write to the other Departments in the Region, giving them suggestions. Sister Beasey asked each delegate to think in their own mind what constitutes a good brochure.

What, in their estimation would make an interesting brochure. What would be the cost - taking into consideration off-set printing could the Region afford it.

It was suggested that each Department have 4 pages - two of these to be pictures.

Thomas Johnson stated the Central Region owes a debt of gratitude to Margaret for keeping this brochure alive. She has devoted several years to it and it took a great deal of her time. However, one of the problems is - we do not have an editor to nurse it thru the press. There is still quite a bit of distance between our getting the thing together and getting it in print, and the cost is great. We are a long way from our goal now. Unless we set a dead line for the material from the various Departments, we will not be able to make it.

Then the question came up regarding financing. If 5,000 brochures were printed at 38¢ a piece, it would come to \$1,950.00. Illinois stated they would advance the sum of \$200.00 towards the

brochure.

It was suggested by Tom Johnson that if every delegate would turn over the sum of money spent at the conference, which would include travel and meals, and dispense with the meeting for one year, this sum could b met. This idea was not favorably received.

The Treasurer reported th balance in Treasury of \$324.28.

The Chairman was asked to shop around for bids, taking into consideration quality of paper, color, etc. and she should take it upon herself not only to look into the quality of material, but also finances.

The following report of the Auditing Committee was read by Roderick Van Trump, Chairman:

"We find the books of the Treasurer, of the Central Region, correct when audited by the undersigned committee."

It was moved by Mildred Biering, seconded by Harry Beasey that the report be accepted. Carried.

The following report of the Resolutions Committee was read by James Blackman, Chairman:

Whereas, we were again privileged to hold our Central Region Conference in this beautiful city of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Whereas, everything has been done to make our stay an enjoyable one, Therefore be it resolved that our Regional Secretary send the Hotel Pfister a letter of thanks.

#2. Whereas, the committee who did such an excellent job in arranging for this meeting and entertainment, therefore be it resolved that we give them a rising vote of thanks.

Edith Nile, Chairman of Legislation stated she did not have much to report as letters must be sent by individuals and not by organizations opposing or approving bills. She asked each state in the Conference to be alerted to the patriotic legislation in their department.

Commander in Chief Joseph S. Rippey was called upon for his message. He congratulated the delegates on the patriotic subjects brought before the meeting. He stated that just because the centennial is over in 1965 should not have a great significance for us, and the work that is

being done by the Chairmen of these committees should not terminate. He also stated that this group is the finest and most progressive, and the delegates at this Conference are the leaders of their State. He urged all present to attend the National Encampment in Richmond, and asked the delegates to support the Banner. He also stressed the need for new members.

Our National President, Emma Wheeler told all present that our Organization has adopted an Altar Cloth and will no longer use the American Flag to place the Bible on. Her project for this year is to raise \$1,000.00 as the Nat'l Organizations share in the "Bell Tower" as a memorial to Women at the Cathedral of the Pines. She asked for personal donations.

Regional Commander, Thomas L. W. Johnson then turned the meeting over to the newly elected Regional Commander, Bessie Goodermont of Illinois.

Each year it is customary to leave a Memorial in the host and hostess city. It was moved by Ellinore L. Konrad, seconded by Betty Johnson that the sum of \$10.00 be given to "Veterant's a Hospital at Wood, Wisconsin. Carried.

There was a discussion regarding selecting a theme for next year. It was moved by Thomas L. W. Johnson, seconded by Charles Brady, Jr. that the theme for the 1965 Central Region Conference be: the Centennial of the Grand Army of the Republic. Carried.



- 3. That special attention be paid to suitable ceremonial regognition of statues of Civil War Commanders in the cities of the Region on the occasion of the Commander's birthday or of some battle in which he rendered distinguished service.
- 4. That Department Commanders and Department Presidents arrange together for a survey of their Departments to locate and list all Civil War Memorials within their geographical areas, with photographs of them, names of artists and doners, etc. This material can then be turned over to the National Historian.

recommendations

After a discussion as to how these **resolutions** would be presented to the various departments, it was moved by CHarles Brady of Illinois, seconded by Bessie Goodermont of Illinois, that the four recommendal given by U. S. Grant, 3rd, be adopted and published in some form. Carried.

Edith B. Nile, Chairman of BUILDING MEMBERSHIP gave the following report:

- 1. Arrange bowling tournaments. Those participating must hold membership cards in the Sons of Union veterans, associate, or Auxiliary.
- 2. Arrange Euchre or Canasta tournaments but in all cases they must hold Sons and Auxiliary or associate membership cards.

A discussion followed. It was suggested that the Sons should promote Junior Civil War Round Tables.

It was moved by Eva Blackman of Illinois, seconded by Doris Johnston of Michigan that these recommendations adopted. Carried.

Thomas Lock, 3rd, Chairman of MILITARY PROGRAM reported as follows:

- 4. Publicize and encourage the youth to join the Veterans Reserve. If you have a uniform or musket to show the youth they will become interested.

 Girls 15 years and older could become interested by making aprons, and having bake sales under the sponsorship of the Auxiliaries.

The discussion opened with regard to the Departments participation in observances of the Centennial.

Brother Bornstein of Illinois reported that they are publishing three books; these books can be obtained in Springfield. Custer Camp No. 1 of Illinois has a uniform color guard and in addition they sponsor a skirmish group - 20 men in Civil War uniforms; they appear in parades, etc. This group was in the reinactment at Bull Run and at Antitum. One of the events was the observance of the death of Stephan Douglas; and in September they observed the 100th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation and also an affair co-sponsored by the negro emancipation league. Prior to that there was an affair at Chicago Centennial Soci ty - the firing on Fort Sumpter.

Alex Levy stated that the Science of Industry opened in Chicago and ithe Sons of Union Veterans were represented.

Margaret Horn requested that any of this material that the Departments could get together should be sent to her. Pictures of any history on dedications, reinactments, etc. so that she could get it in the form of a brochure for the Regional only.

Brother Bornstein informed the Regional that one or two of the very good pictures were sent to the Banner but because they were colored, they were refused.

James L. High told Brother Bornstein that Al Lambert said his Eproblem is to find space in the Banner for all of these pictures.

It was agreed by Brother Mathias that all of ithis talk was very pleasing but he was wondering if we are receiving any new members from all of this.

Brother Bornstein said that all this talk about the Civil War Centennial and what an opportunity it was for our Organization to build up our membership is getting us nowhere. He stated it is getting less instead of more. Eligibles are not interested. Those who are not eligible are much more interested. So they are thinking of bringing more people into our Organization thru associate membership. He said as Secretary he was going over his records. More and more of the Camps are dying. When Past Commander in Chief Richard Locke passed away, the Rockford camp died also. He was keeping up this camp and since his death this is just anoth r camp that is defunct. Unless we get on the ball we will be as dead as the Grand Army of the Republic is now. This idea of making k people offic rs just for honor is all wrong.

Thomas Lock 3rd disagreed with Brother Bornstein that the Sons of Union Veterans are dying. He stated three years ago, thru working with Margaret Horn he just learned about the Sons of Union Veterans. He has received 7 applications for new members and Indianapolis has 6 new members icoming in. They are also organizing flag groups and drilling these boys in flag brigades and keeping ithem busy. He has great hope for the Sons but he stated it must be in the hands of the young and out of the hands of the old.

Earl Corbin reported that Ohio had an increase of 44 members. A great deal of this is due to the Civil War Regiments in Cleveland, Akron j and Mansfield under the direction of Col. Daniel F. Clancy.

Then followed a discussion regarding junior members. Lovina Lorah stated she ran an add in the local papers and also used the Radio but received not calls from eligibles. She then went to schools but jthey would not allow her to get information direct from the students.

Sadie Keefer announced there is not enough history of the Civil War taught in our schools today. Children are ignorant of this war.

Brother Coburn announced that the high schools in Illinois require one year of history otherwise the students do not graduate. He stated the juniors and seniors wanted to start a Civil War Round table and they were very enthusiastic. These boys have presented their own programs and one boy even brought in his own arsenal for display. They also give talks on Civil War coins, money and papers.

Alex Levy mentioned that in the last couple of weeks there has been a lot of commotion on the Mason-Dixon line. All you see are confederate flags. He said the disease is coming into the north. They will not fly an American flag but they will fly a confederate flag. They are using them for something that is not good for our youth. There is too much southern propaganda. They are actually using the Civil War Centennial for this purpose and something ought to be done about it.

Edith Nile was reminded of the National Encampment that was; held in Washington, D. C. in 1936. She said confederate flags were flying over many of the buildings at that time. When they asked the authorities what could be done about it they said NOTHING!

James Blackman announced that since our last Conference P. C. in C. Richard F. Locke and Commander-in-Chief, Brother Messer have passed away. He felt it would be fitting and proper at this time to have a brief memorial service for them and all deceased members from the Central Region. By request of the Regional Commander, all delegates stood in silent prayer for one moment in; memory of the deceased.

Mae Levin, Regional Patriotic Instructor extended the greetings from Colorado and said she was so happy to make the trip from Denver to Milwaukee to attend this Conference.

Th Department Commanders and Department Presidents were called upon to report the activities or problems in their respective Departments.

Department President of Indiana, Hannah Kreisher extended the greetings from her State and extended best wishes for a most successful meeting. She stated they are planning for the National Encampment next year and hope to be good hosts and hostesses. She also extended an invitation to attend their Mid-Winter meeting and repption at Frankfort. She closed with: "We are so proud of our Junior Vic Commander-in-Chief, Brother Cecil McConahay, for the honor he brought home to the State of Indiana."

Brother Corbin of Ohio brought greetings from his Department Commander and stated that due to conflicting meetings in the State of Ohio, he was unable to be at this Conference. Publicity is what is needed now in Ohio. They are trying to organise a Battery in Akron to advance this project, but funds are needed — and that is what is holding them back.

Dr. Sanborn, Dept. Commander of Wisconsin stated the activities of Wisconsin have been mainly centered around the Hospital at Tomah. At our Department Encampment the allied group as a whole leaves their love token at this Hospital. It is a Worthwhile cause.

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Dept. President Rasona Black of Wisconsin reported that although Wisconsin is few in number, each year we are striving to carry on the work of our forefathers. As Hoste s of the Conference she wishes for all delegates a very succ seful and constructive meeting and hopes their stay in Milwaukee will be a very pleasant one.

George Powers, P.D.C. of Wisconsin reviewed the report given by Ellinore L. Konrad in the 1959 minutes on the activities in Wisconsin regarding the Civil War Centennial. He stated the Sons and Auxiliary are willing to co-operate but it is not a question of cooperating but doing something. Wisconsin was to receive an appropriation for their Centennial work but nothing has been forthcoming. Sinc Wisconsin is not getting any money from the legislature we will have to go to big establishments and ask for donations. This will require foot work. Wisconsin did not have any battlefields but we did have a very important "Iron Brigade."

Brother Bornetein reported that Illinois formed a Civil War Centennial Commission about a year ago. The State Legislature appropriated a large sum of money but it was used up for other things by the Advisory Board. In Rockford the Illinois State Historical Society has an air conditioned truck with a Civil War exhibit. They have a very fine exhibit of letters, books, mementos, etc. The man who drives the truck wears a Civil War Uniform. The school children are very impressed with it.

Brother Mathias stated the southern states are appropriating large sums of money but the northern States are not cooperating.

Brother McConahay - Indiana is in the same position - we do not have the funds to do what we want to. We all belong to the Historical Society and one-half of us are on the Centennial and the other half on the State Commission. I am co-chairman and I do want to tell you what Indiana is doing. We meet every month. We do not have Civil War battle fields but Camp Tipacance - We are writing a history on that. We are compiling the memoirs of every soldier who had enlisted in Tipacance. We have several old grist mills and plans are that we will restore them. Flat boats and steamers come up the Wabash river and we are going to establish a park. We are compiling a book on all the Civil War Veterans in all the Cemeteries. We are also compiling a speakers bureau.

Charles Brady - Caro may be the one and only thing that Illinois will be doing with regard to the Centennial. It is a small town in our State and the lady who is making the major plans for this said she needed something to pass out. Printing a phamplet to give out would be doing us a service as well as the Centennial.

Brother Mathias - We put an article in the paper asking all the interested people of the Civil War ancestery to let us know and write to our local Secretary and give us their name as we were going to try to put on a program every week or every other week. We are hoping to dig out a diary or other information to make it interesting to the local people.

Brother Bornstein stated he was appointed Chairman of the membership committee in the Central Region. He asked each Department in the Central Region to appoint a membership Chairman. Then have this Department Chairman appoint a Chairman of ach Camp. In that way we could co-ordinate. He asked that we please bring this message back to the Department Commanders. He said he learned something - if you tell people - you sell them. If you don't tell them you don't sell them. If w don't do it now -we never will.

Dick Locke then asked whether he could put on a little skit. His cast consisted of Charles Bornstein, Roscoe Mathias, and Charles Brady. Broth r Locke asked them questions and they too asked questions such s:

We cannot join because we are too busy with other Organization.

How much would it cost them?

What do you do at the meetings?

Brother Locke summed it up by telling them there are many men who would give anything to be a member of the Sons. Too many of our members take the position they join the camp, pay their dues, have a good time but they don't do a thing to further ur Order.

Suggestions were then given as to how to hold the interest of the members:

By dinner meetings and a program.

Dinner meeting once a month with speaker - preferably a writer of Civil War History.

By wearing the Sons lapel button. People will be
curious and ask questions about it.

Me ting recessed until 9 A.M. Sunday, October 16th.

Saturday evening at 6:30 P.M. a dinner was held in honor of the Regional delegates. This was very well planned by Rasona Black, Chairman and her co-workers.

The speaker for the evening was M. Gerlinger, Chairman of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. He showed slides and spoke on the historical battlegrounds of the Civil War. It was very interesting and enjoyed by all.

Entertainment followed.

On Sunday morning October 16th, at 9:30 A.M. the second session of the Central Region Conference was called to order by Commander Biering.

Sister Ellinore L. Konrad reported on the progress made by the State of Wisconsin regarding plans for the Civil War Centennial. She stated that

The program setup by Civil War Centennial Commission of Wisconsin has received much comment and is being adopted by many states.

The you know, the purpose of the Civil War Centennial Commission is to commemorate Battles of the Civil War, set up museums, observe National Patriotic Holidays with fitting programs, pageants, placing markers on memorial sites pertaining to the Civil War, acquiring valuable manuscripts, relics of many descriptions, re-enacting various other type of affairs - all pertaining to the Civil War.

At the present time the Wisconsin Commission is seeking an appropriation of several thousands of dollars from the Legislature for plans for the Lincoln Memorial Wing of the State Historical Society Building. If built, it will house the G.A.R. Museum now located in the State Capitol in Madison.

Each State will carry out their own programs and other activities. Inasmuch as no battle of the Civil War was fought on Wisconsin soil, the following program has been recommended by the Wisconsin Commission:

Award scholarships each year, beginning in 1961. Introducing special programs on Civil War history with the school curriculium during Centennial years. Having movies, radio and television programs carrying the Civil War story to the people; to create a speakers bureau; Exhibit the State Historical Society's History-Mobile. Drama and art groups to take part. Haskill letters be published. At least one interpretive book and one monograph of edited documents be piblished each year through the State Historical Society. Erection of markers, memorials and monuments in the State of Wisconsin. Highway 41 be renamed the Iron Brigade Highway and wherever possible new highways be named after Civil War leaders, battles, unts, etc. An Snventory of Civil War monuments, markers, military equipment, etc. to be made by patriotic organizations. Headquarters is assembling lists of Civil War Widows still alive. These will be sent out to organizations that we may wish to give special attention to these individuals in our own communities. Special stams to commemorate 30 outstanding engagements of the war have

To commemorate the centennial of this war we do not want to string together a series of holidays, but rather the centennial must give us a new understanding of the way in which Americans built from sacrifice and suffering and enduring Nation and a lasting peace.


Department President of Wisconsin, Sister Mildred Biering extended an invitation to the Region to meet in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in 1960.

Past Commander-in-Chief, Richard Locke, said that we never had the opportunity in our existence that we will have in the next five or six years to increase our membership. This during the Centennial of the Civil War. Down south they are more interested than we are. To them it was a family scrap. The Civil War ended when Lee surrendered. Others keep it alive with bitterness. Honorary Chairman of the Centennial is President Eisenhower, Honorary Chairman, Vice President Nixon and Rayburn. General Grant is the active chairman. The Sons and Auxiliaries, Ladies of the G.A.R. and the W.R.C. presented a walking bar-they ended up with purchasing three pieces of equipment. The Head of the Childrens' Home said that progress was being made by the use of the new equipment.

It seems that the Daughters of the Union Veterans are pulling away from the affiliated order.

Illinois-Past National President, Eva Blackman, and Past Department President, Ethel Heilemann, spoke on money being sent to the Bonaparte School for the handicapped children. Their scholarship fund has been raised from \$100.00 to \$150.00.

Indiana-Department President, Florence Bodle, said that they helped retarded children. They help to keep them occupied.

Wisconsin-Department Patriotic Instructor, Mildred Biering, spoke on the help given the men at Tomah. Their minds and hands do not co-ordinate. They are the "forgotten men". They cannot sell articles as the Government furnishes the supplies to them. Milwaukee has adopted three of these men. They remember them at Christmas and on their Birthdays.

Past Department Commander, George Powers, Centennial Chairman from Wisconsin spends a great deal of time travelling. Wisconsin seems to be taking the lead on the Centennial.

Commander-in-Chief, Earl Riggs, said that a certificate of merit was given the Department of Pennsylvania. It was a juke box to the V Veterans Childrens' Hospital.

The Gold Memorial that General Grant has will be placed on the steps on the Altar at Rheim, New Hampshire. This Altar is a Memorial by Robert Sloan for his son who was killed in the war. The Flag on the Flagpole flies at half-mast because it was taken off the casket of a soldier who was killed in service. There are now around fifty Flags.

A medallion with a picture of General Grant and General Lee on and the inscription The War Between the States is to be placed in the Capitol in Washington.

It was stressed that we do considerable planning for the Centennial and that we go to the Central Region next year prepared to talk on same.

It was suggested by Mildred Biering that the Commander write to each Department and see if we can get more out to our meetings. Past National President Wilma Combs of Iowa, thinks that a little personal contact will bring back the Iowa people. They used to be very well represented. She will have a reception for them if they will come.

Past Department Commander Dave Drake of Illinois spoke. He said that Wisconsin has a large number of eligibles. Illinois has quite a large number. He is on the grave marking committee. He says that a family must now sign for a marker. There are still about four hundred markers. Springfield has a record of the soldiers. Red Cross has information.

There will be a program on April 14 at Lincoln's Tomb at 10:00 A.M. More about this in the Banner.

Mattis Schesley. coverage of the 1956 Central Region meeting, and dedication of Albert Toolson statue in Harrisburg Natl Encamp. was speken of in detail. On Apr. E. 1957 attended the 91st Ann. Dinner commemorating the GAR Founding date at Midland Hotel. On Memorial Day I was in the Parade of May 30th with the SONS; was a Golor Guard in the SONS uniform with Bro. Blackman and Char. Bournstine PDCommanders. I also was the Chr. of Transportation, procurring all cars used in this parade. wwas appointed by Dept. Com. FORT HAYES HOTEL, COLUMBUS, OHIO, OCTOBER 13 and 14, 1956.

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 PM by Commander of Central Region Conference Louis G.Blair.

Invocation by Bro. W. E. Corbin Due to the Absent of the Chaplin Roy Bennett.

Of course, it is not always simple or easy to pully the past to the present, or to see when the needs of today have been answered by the record of the past. But the extent to which Christianity accomplishes that also determines its success as an effective force in the world.

No we not see in that a similarity with the problem facing the Survey?

The are an old organization. Our cradle was far back in the past. We

have been affiliated with an even older organization—the Grand Granu of

the Republic. Like Christianitu, we are a repository of ideals, principles

and illustrious examples from the past; but is our attachment to the past

so fundivided that we overlook the requirements of the present hour?

If our thinking and activity revolve too much around the past, we may not

We should remember that the men from whom we draw special inspiration were

The first meeting was called to order at 2 P. M. Saturday October 21, by the Senior Vice Commander, Theodore H. Mohr of St. Louis, Mo. He instructed the Secretary, Ellinore Konrad of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to read a telegram received from the Regional Commander, Franklin S. Hubbard of Kenosha, Wisconsin. It is as follows:

The General Outline of Program for 1950-51 from the Commander-in-Chief, Cleon E. Heald, was read by the Secretary. There then followed a discussion on each section of the program submitted without formal action.

Department President, Leona Jones of Indiana, extended an invitation to all those attending the Conference to attend the reception honoring our National President, Lela B. Shugart, Saturday evening, the twenty-eighth of October, 1950, 8 o'clock, Spencer Hotel, Marion, Indiana.

The report of the Regional Commander, Franklin S. Hubbard, was read by the Secretary and accepted; and the recommendations contained therein were discussed.

It was suggested by Wilbur Hathaway, P.D.C. that the Region be divided into districts as follows:

After a lengthy discussion regarding sub-dividing the Region into districts, Richard F. Locke, P.C. in C. informed the Conference that in an organization such as this, which has no constitution or by-laws, and whose existence was by action of the Commandery-in-Chief, the implied power of the order for which the Region was created would be vested in the Regional Commander, if his actions are not contrary to the Commandery-in-Chief.

It was moved by Wilbur Hathaway, P.D.C. that the incoming Regional Commander sub-divide the Region into Districts and they in turn hold district meetings at intervals throughout the year and report their progress to the Regional Commander by correspondence or meetings. Seconded by Allan Holbrook, P.C. in C. and carried.

Theodore Mohr, S.V.C. then called for a discussion regarding recognition of the Region by the National body.

Richard F. Locke, P.C. in C. informed the Conference that only two of the four Regions are functioning at the present time. He feels it is very important that a report be submitt d to the National

from the Central Region. This report is to come from the Regional Commander.

It was moved by Allan Holbrook, P.C. in C. that the incoming Regional Commander appoint a Committee on "Program and Policy". Seconded by Roy Lewis, R.T. and carried.

It was moved by Wilbur Hathaway, P.D.C., seconded by Norma Beaumont, P.P. that the recommendations in Brother Hubbard's report be adopted. Carried.

Allan Holbrook, P.C.in C. announced that tonight in Keene, New Hampshire, a reception is being held for our Commander-in-Chief. It was moved by Brother Holbrook, seconded by Richard F. Locke, P.C.in C. that the Secretary be instructed to send a telegram to Cleon E. Heald containing the heartiest greetings from the Central Region. Carried.

The report of Roy R. Lewis, Regional Treasurer, was read and accepted. The amount on hand as of October 1, 1950 is \$42.25. A full and complete report is attached to these minutes.

Mrs. Phil Byron announced the plans for dinner. It was to be served in the main dining room and everyone to order as they wished. She also stated the Kankakee Auxiliary arranged a program after dinner.

A letter from Ruth Elaine Phillips, Court Reporter who took the minutes of the 1949 Conference, was read. In it she stated there is a balance on her books against our Organization in the amount of \$20.30.

Wilbur Hathaway, P.D.C. stated he arranged with Mrs. Phillips for her services. She was paid \$15.00 for taking the minutes and she was to be paid a nominal fee when the minutes were condensed and mimeographed. Inasmuch as the work was never completed, he questioned the balance.

It was moved by Allan Holbrook, P.C.in C. and seconded by A. Leroy Reynolds, that the Secretary be instructed to write Mrs. Phillips and have her clarify this situation. Carried.

The following were appointed on the Nominating Committee:

The following were appointed on the Auditing Committee:

Richard F. Locke, P.C.in C. reported on the G. A. R. Highway. He stated it was still functioning and he was asked to write to Governor

Lee of Utah to sign the bill. Governor Lee did so at once and Brother Locke received a very fine letter from Governor Lee stating it pleased him very much to sign the bill and never had he signed anything that gave him so much satisfaction.

The Department Presidents and Department Commanders were called upon to report the activities or problems in their respective Departments.

A. Leroy Reynolds, D.C. reported that one problem facing the Department of Illinois is placing, or storing for the time being, the G. A. R. records, trophies and relics. He stated that James Blackman is Secretary to the G. A. R. and Cora Gillis asked him to take care of the material. This was discussed at length and many sugg stions were offered such as storing them temporarily in the Court House, Public Library, etc.

Membership was then brought up for discussion. Theodore H. Mohr told the Conference that in St. Louis they have three camps; dues are \$5.00 a year and instead of a receipt, membership cards are printed. Instead of meeting monthly, they meet four times a year and each meeting is a dinner meeting. They are very successful and most of the members turn out because it is an incentive.

Hattie Reynolds, D.C. told the Conference she organized an Auxiliary in Decatur and seventy members signed the Charter.

Junior Camps were then discussed. Roy J. Bennett announced that h organized a Junior Camp in Des Moines, Iowa, with the help of Ethel Jones, known as the "Roy J. Bennett Camp of Junior Grandsons". They are all direct descendants of Union Veterans, ranging in age from seven to fifteen years of age. They are self-supporting and take the part the Sons teach them. They are being prepared to step in rank when the Sons are gone. He asked whether the Regional had the power to endorse this movement in order to get some recognition from the National. Brother Bennett was assured that if he would prepare a resolution the Region would submit it to the National for consideration.

A letter from P.C.in C. John H. Runkel was read by the Secretary regarding his trip to Los Angeles, September 3, 1950. In it he stated he extended the greetings to the three Sister Organizations and delivered to each of the organizations the invitation as extended by the Columbus Chamber of Commerce to meet in Columbus, Ohio, the following year. The Allied Heads agreed to meet in Columbus sometime in the near future to see if something could be worked out in harmony in order that the five organizations could meet together.

Richard F. Locke reported that the Sons are about to make formal application for a Congressional Charter. He stated as incorporators they wanted members of our organization hold positions of responsibility. As they now have them, they are in a position to make formal application to Congress.

Richard F. Locke was also asked to speak on the Trust Fund. He stated it was discuss d at National but no definite action was taken.

It was moved by Wilbur Hathaway that the Secretary be instructed to send a wire to Franklin S. Hubbard regretting his inability to attend this very fine meeting and wishing his wife well. It was seconded by Richard F. Locke and carried.

Theodore H. Mohr requested the delegates to register. He asked for a registration fee of 50% to defray expenses.

Meeting recessed until 9 o'clock Sunday morning.

After having dinner in the main dining room of the Kankakee Hot 1, the members of the Conference went back to the meeting room on the mezzanine floor. The Mayor of Kankakee was there and gave an address of welcome. The Literary Guild then put on a few short plays. They also furnished piano and accordian solos as well as vocal solos. After the entertainment the National Officers were called upon to speak. The entire program planned by the Committee was most delightful and enjoyed by all.

Sunday morning, October 22, 1950, the second session of the Central Region Conference was called to order by the Senior Vice Commander, Theodore H. Mohr. at 9 o'clock A. M.

Ethel Jones, Regional Chaplain offered prayer.

"America" was sung by the assembly, also the Salute to the Flag.

Wilbur Hathaway extended an invitation to hold the next Regional meeting in Des Moines, Iowa.

It was moved by norma Beaumont, that we accept the invitation of Brother Hathaway to hold our 1951 Regional Conference in Des Moines, Iowa. This was seconded by A. Leroy Reynolds and carried.

Bills were read by the Secretary:

Mohr, that the Secretary b instructed to writ a letter of appreciation to Mr. & Mrs. Phil Byron and Committee, thanking them for their efforts in making the Conference a success. The entertainment in the evening also showed much work and fine management for the entire week end. This was seconded by Richard F. Locke and carried.

A. LeRoy Reynolds, D. C. stated that they want to continue to keep the Illinois Memorial alive and he wants to Regional to help all it can.

Leona Jones, D. P. extended an invitation to all to attend th Indiana Mid-Winter Encampment to be held in Muncie, January 13th and 14th, 1951.

Ethel Jones, P.D.P. extended an invitation to attend their Mid-Year meeting October 28th and 29th, 1950, Waterloo, Iowa.

Ellinore Konrad extended an invitation, in behalf of her Department President, Mary A. Harrison, to attend Wisconsin's Mid-Year Conference November 19th in Milwaukee.

The report of the nominating committee was presented on behalf of the Chairman, A. Leroy Reynolds, the other members, Wilbur F. Hathaway and Norma Beaumont having concurred. The committee recommended the following:

The Secretary read the following resolution signed by Mrs. Ethel Jones and Mr. Roy J. Bennett:

"We, the members of this Region, endorse the movement originated at Des Moines, Iowa, on March 6, 1949, in forming a Junior Grandsons of the Union Veterans of the Civil War, to build a living monument to the memory of the Boys who wore the Blue and fought to preserve this Union.

Whereas, we of this Conference petition our National Body to appoint a Committee to draft a charter and

ritual to be used by this organization and set up By-Laws and a governing body to further the work of the Junior Grandsons of the Civil War."

It was moved by Wilbur Hathaway, that this resolution be adopted. Seconded by Richard F. Locke and unanimously carried.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read by the Chairman, Ethel Jones. It was moved by A. Leroy Reynolds, that this report be accepted. Seconded by Allan Holbrook and carried.

Roy Lewis, Treasurer, reminded the Departments at the Conference that the dues for the year are \$5.00.

It was moved by Norma Beaumont that the sum of \$10.00 be paid to Ellinore Konrad to reimburse her for long distance calls to Des Moines, Iowa, Decatur, Illinois, and a trip to Kenosha, Wisconsin, the day before the Regional meeting. Seconded by Richard F. Locke and carried.

There being no further business to come before the Conference, the meeting was adjourned at 11:45 A. M. Sunday, October 22nd, with the singing of "God Be With You 'Til We Meet Again".

All in attendance joined together in prayer, led by the Regional Chaplain, followed by the pledge of allegiance to the American Flag.

Mr. C. E. Pennington, Commander of the local camp, gave an Address of Welcome, also presenting a floral centerpiece from he and Mrs. Pennington for the speaker's table.

The roll was called by States, and the following states were represented:

Delegates were expected in at a later time from Minnesota, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado.

Commander Hathaway announced the plans for the banquet to be held at 6:30 P. M. Saturday evening, the price of the banquet tickets to be \$3.00.

Commander Hathaway called for the Reading of Communications. Communications were received from the National President, Mrs. E. Tucker; Commander-in-Chief, John Rockwell; Sr. Vice-Commander of the Region, Theo. H. Moore; and from Michael G. Heinz of Ohio.

The next order of business was the reportsffrom the different departments, the auxiliaries reporting first, as follows:

The departments reported of the progress made during the past year and of the increase in memberships and new camps.

A report of the Indianapolis Conference was given, followed by an open discussion from the floor.

Highlights of the convention of the Sons was given by Commander Hathaway in which he discussed at great length of the passing of the G.A.R.

Brother Lock, Chairman of the Resolution Committee, gave a short talk regarding the passing of the GAR.

(Excerpts from Brother Lock's testimony)

don't believe in talking that way. We hear a great deal about the United States of America and what they should do now to save the world from Communism, and perhaps, even from oblivion. We should only follow the precepts which we learned from our forefathers in order to point the way to the things which should be done in the present day and age.

We hear talk about the 40, 35, or 30 hour week. Don't you realize that America wasn't built on a forty-hour week? We hear talk about plowing under crops and the like. If there is any sense in it I haven't sufficient comprehension to realize it.

I have said this before and many of you have heard me say it ---- that the Civil War was purely a family scrap. It was settled two or three generations ago and the real true southern realizes and will tell you today that it was settled right. One of the results of the war was the extinction of slavery, and there was no material difference of opinion between the people of the north and of the south ---- they had the same family traditions and they had the same national traditions. They are substantially one race.

However, there was a long period of time when the north was against the south and when the south was against the north.

I was made chairman of the Committee on Resolutions of the Indiana encampment and was anxious to learn the attitudes of the camp regarding certain resolutions which were to be passed or brought up....and it is only through the people who believe in American ideals which will save this country of ours in substantially the same way as our forefathers did."

Brother Hubbard was called upon for a report of his activities.

(Excerpts from Brother Hubbard's testimony.)

... "I have enjoyed working in my job during this last year. The work is very interesting.

.... "the National GAR fund is to be continued, and it was voted upon at the Indiana Encampment. You folks all know what that fund is used for. It is used to assist the GAR in obtaining some of the comforts that they might not otherwise be able to receive in their advanced age. Part of the fund this year is to be used for the Arlington Home and for the Lincoln Memorial in Tennessee...."

Brother Hubbard spoke of his work in the Banner and of the assistance which he had received from the various departments.

He also mentioned the fact that many donations had been received and of the amounts turned in from the various States.

.... "a registration fee of \$2.00 per member for the Encampment of the Commander-in-Chief was adopted, and we have already applied for a Congressional charter for our organization."

- Q. How much of the GAR fund is allotted to the Tennessee group and how much to the Arlington Home?
- A. (By Brother Hathaway) I made a statement that a portion of the fund was to be used this year, but I can't say just how much will be taken out of that fund. I believe \$50.00 was to go to the Arlington Home. Can anyone explain about the Tennessee set-up?

BROTHER LOCK: I think the matter was left in the hands of the Commander-in-Chief, the National Secretary, and the Councilin-Chief. They are to look into the matter and they have been given the authority to act.

Brother Hathaway announced that the delegates would then hear of the "passing of the GAR".

(Excerpts from Brother Hathaway's testimony.)

.... "They will be with us as long as they are able to travel and to come, but they will not transact any business. I had hoped to have someone here who had witnessed their meeting, but they are not here and I will depend on some of you here who did attend the Campfire."

Following a discussion from the floor, Brother Hathaway then reported on the GAR Campfire.

.... "The idea of the GAR passing out is a mighty bad one.

The next order of business was the reading of the minutes of the last convention by the secretary. There being no objections, the minutes were approved as read.

The Treasure's report was read. A balance of \$122.10 was reported on hand and said report was approved as read.

Brother Hathaway mentioned the fact that the GAR was organized in a room on the second floor at 253 S. Park Street in Decatur, Illinois. All members were urged to view the plaque which still exists.

Brother Reynolds of Decatur reported on the first meeting of the GAR..., stating the post was organized in 1882, with thirteen members present.

At this time an adjournment was taken to Sunday, October 16, 1949.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 16, 1949

Commander Hathaway read additional communications which had been received since the Saturday session.

A discussion was had upon "Memorials", and the various departments reported of the progress made in their own department.

Commander Linn Cannon of Decatur then gave a brief talk.

A discussion was held upon the resolution now passed by the organization for a national memorial for the memory of the GAR.

Commander Hathaway then stated that to expedite matters he would appoint a committee to make a study of the nomination of officers for the coming year, further stating that this committee would not elect the officers but would submit a list of names. For the auxiliary, Mrs. Jones of Iowa and Mrs. Kreischner of Indiana was appointed.

Commander Hathaway reported on his trip throughout the South. An open discussion was then had from the floor.

An announcement was made that the Program and Policy Committee would meet in the near future.

Charles E. Lee of Decatur gave a brief talk to the group.

Eleanor Konrad gave a report of the Program & Policy Committee of the Regional Association.

A discussion was had relative to the Banner receiving more publicity inorder to stimulate interest.

An additional report was given by the treasurer, indicating the balance on hand at this time to be \$188.10.

A discussion was had concerning the payment of dues by each department.

A motion was made and duly seconded that the next annual meeting be held in Kankakee, Illinois.

Cleared and Issued Through Facilities of the Office of War Information

Joseph B. Eastman, director of the Office of Defense Transportation, today called on the American people to hold the line against conventions, trade shows, and other gatherings as a means of curtailing travel.

Because of the greatly increased pressure on travel facilities during the past several months, it is more important than ever before, Mr. Eastman declared, that such events be foregone until after the war.

The CDT director pointed out that persons attending conventions which can in no way aid in the prosecution of the war take up just as much room in trains and buses as persons traveling on missions directly connected with the war.

The holding of meetings not connected with the war effort not only places and unnecessary added strain on trains and buses, but also puts a burden on hotels and many other civilian services that could be avoided with no read loss to any one, Mr. Eastman declared.

Mr. Eastman said that many conventions have been canceled in the past in response to his earlier requests, but that many organizations have declined to call off their meetings. As a result, some organizations which had previously canceled their meetings "have felt they could not continue to conform with our convention policy," ir. Eastman said.

Text of Mr. Eastman's statement follows:

"For many months the Office of Defense Transportation has sought to impress upon the officials and members of organizations and associations the urgent necessity, from a transportation standpoint, of canceling conventions, trade shows, and other group meetings.

"Many organizations have responded patriotically and called off their scheduled meetings. Many others have not. And largely because others have not canceled their conventions, so a organizations which originally gave us their cooperation have felt they could not convinue to conform with our convention policy.

"In taking up this subject again, I want to make our policy, based on present-day transportation demands, perfectly plain. The Office of Defense Transportation cannot issue erders forbidding the holding of conventions. The right of assembly is protected by the Constitution. The Office of Defense Transportation has no power, and certainly no desire, to infringe on the exercise of that right. Cancellation of a convention, therefore, must be a voluntary act on the part of those responsible for the organization's affairs.

"The principal interest of the Office of Defense Transportation in group meetings is in their effect upon the ability of the country's transportation systems to perform the primary war services upon which the Nation relies. It is my responsibility, as director of the Office of Defense Transportation, to do everything in my power to see that nothing is allowed to interfere with satisfactory performance of those services.

"When people in large numbers suddenly converge on our busy war denters, they not only put an additional strain on our already overworked transportation facilities, but it is apparent to all who travel that they take up hotel space badly needed by military and other war business travelers and interfere in many other ways with the war effort.

"I must say emphatically that conventions and other group meetings interfere, and interfere seriously, with provision of adequate passenger service for movement of military and essential war-business traffic. In this regard, the difference between a large and a small convention is only one of degree. Any convention which attracts attendants from other cities who travel by train or bus requires use of travel space that is now needed by members of the armed forces or by civilians traveling on war business.

"There are various reasons why convention travel under present conditions interferes with other travel. Convention travel is concentrated in time and place. The convention attendants may come singly or in small groups from various parts of the country. But they all converge on a single city within the space of a day or a few days, and they all depart within an equally short space of time. Equipment shortages now make it impossible to permit handling of this traffic in special cars or trains. The result is that the convention attendants, making their reservations well in advance, monopolize the travel space on regular trains in and out of the convention city on the days in question, leaving little or no space for military and essential business passengers.

The problem is extremely serious when, as is the case today, there is a tremendous volume of military and highly important business traffic. Business men or government officials traveling on missions connected with war production or other war activities can seldom make plans far ahead. Inability to obtain transportation may easily cause serious delays in the projects on which they are engaged.

"Organizations and associations are in position to contribute materially to the relief of this situation by foregoing annual convertions, trade shows, and similar meetings for the duration. I realize that many such meetings may have a close relation to the war effort and may therefore seem to be justified. However, when their adverse effect upon vital war transportation service, and hotel service, is taken into consideration, I believe it will be found that in most cases a greater contribution can be made to the war effort by canceling the meeting than by holding it.

"I therefore most earnestly urge the executives and members of all organizations scheduling conventions, trade shows, or other group meetings, in 1944 to reconsider their plans, give careful thought to the strains which their meetings will impose on our heavily burdened transportation facilities, and make their decisions on the backs of the complete picture. And I must ask, as I have asked before, that meetings involving travel not be held unless the responsible officers of the organizations concerned are thoroughly convinced that the meetings will help to shorter the war.

"The months ahead will be a very critical time for transportation in this country. It will be a tile when there must be the most strenuous and sustained effort to keep the transportation systems functioning smoothly and at highest efficiency. Organizations and other groups can give the greatest help in that effort by canceling their conventions and meetings and thus lightening the travel load.

"Those organizations which already have postponed their conventions until after the war have, by their leadership, made a real contribution to the winning of the war and they can take deserved pride in their action." To Executives of National, State, Regional and District Organizations:

Director Joseph B. Eastman of the Office of Defense Transportation issued a public statement today, in which he reiterated previous requests for the cancellation of conventions and similar group meetings because of the strain which such travel-stimulating events impose on our war-burdened public transportation facilities.

In order that you may be fully informed as to the impact of sonvention travel on the present transportation situation, and as to the attitude of the Office of Defense Transportation on this problem, I am sending you a copy of the full text of Mr. Eastman's statement.

I should like to emphasize one point: the Office of Defense Transportation cannot undertake to assess the essentiality of any convention or other group meeting. The decision as to whether or not a convention shall be held must be made by the appropriate officials of each organization without the benefit of special advice from this office. Our judgment, based wholly on transportation considerations, is that all events which stimulate travel should be cancelled for the duration.

After reading the attached statement, I hope you will find it possible to initiate action which will add your organization to the list of those showing leadership in and full cooperation with our travel conservation program.

A meeting called for the purpose of forming a regional organization of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and its Auxiliary was called to order at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon at The American Legion Hall, Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, by Dewey B. Meade, Commander of the Department of Minnesota, who had been chosen Chairman of a temporary organization effected at a meeting held at La Crosse, Wisconsin, in 1939, and camp was opened with the following officers: Dewey B. Meade as Commander; Roy Lewis, Past Department Commander of Wisconsin as Senier Vice Commander; Charles E. Ross, Department Commander of Iowa as Junior Vice Commander; J. E. Gallagher, Department Commander of Illinois as Patriotic Instructor; Phil Byron, Junior Vice Commander in Chief as Chaplain; Ben Haag, Past Department Commander of Wisconsin as Guide and C. H. Dean as Color Guard, and W. R. Graves, Acting Secretary.

Brother Meade stated the purpose of the meeting was to effect a regional organization. He announced that in as much as there were three candidates of Fort Crawford Cemp Number 3, of Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin in waiting to be mustered into the order and the mustering in of such candidates would be the next order of business.

Earl O'Brien, grandson of Tim O'Brien, Hubert C. Freeman, great grandson of Oliver Caswell, and Clarence Wade, grandson of Alvin Cook, being in waiting were duly admitted and mustered into the order as members of Fort Crawford Camp Number 3.

The meeting reconvened at 1:30 and Junior Vice Commander in Chief, Phil Byron, gave an address explaining a system adopted by the Department of Illinois for securing members.

There was a general discussion of this Illinois plan and of other matters pertaining to the welfare of the order.

It was moved by Brother Phil Byron and seconded by Brother A. S. Holbrook that the Sons of Union Veterans and its Auxiliary have joint membership in this region. Motion carried.

The Acting Commander announced the next order of business to be the election of officers. Brother Phil Byron nominated Dewey Meade for Commander of the region and there being no further nominations it was moved, seconded and carried that nominations be closed and the Acting Secretary be authorized to cast the unanimous ballot for Brother Meade. The ballot was cast and Brother Meade was declared elected regional Commander.

Brother J. E. Gallagher nominated Sister Hazel Lester as Vice Commander and on rising vote Sister Lester was duly elected.

PREAMBLE or PURPOSE

Inspired and influenced by the many and good benefits that have been achieved by other organizations, national in scope, through their intra-state, district, or departmental, meetings and conferences, this organization is created solely for the purpose of promoting the general prestige of the two patriotic orders, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and the Auxiliary to the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. This organization shall in no manner or degree seek to oppose, supplant, or antagonize the Supreme Authority as is recognized and properly resides with the two National Bodies; or any of the Departmental edicts of the several Departments represented.

NAME

This organization shall be known as the UPPER MISSISSIPPI VALLEY REGION, and shall include the states or Bepartments of Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin. Its personnel shall be drawn from the membership in good standing of both Orders, and identified with the Camps and Auxiliaries of the States or Departments above mentioned. Evidence of good standing in their respective Orders shall be the only requirement for eligibility herein.

MEETINGS

One regular meeting, or conference, of this organization shall be held each year at such time and place as is hereinafter prescribed.

OFFICERS

In conformity with the established and accepted form of all regularly constituted bodies, officers of this organization shall be; viz; President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, all of which shall be elected to serve for the term of one year. In addition to the regular officers above named, there shall be elected at the regular officers are elected, and for the same term, one Son and one Auxiliary member from each of the four Departments. This group of eight members shall constitute, or be known as, the Board of Directors, or Council.

TIME OF ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Election of Officers and Board of Directors for this organization shall occur near the close of the Order of Business during the last session of each annual meeting.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ELECTION TO OFFICE

All members of this organization are eligible for election to office. PROVIDED, they must be present at the time of election.

NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING

Not later than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed upon for the next annual meeting, the Secretary shall prepare and forward, or cause to be prepared and forwarded, to the Department Secretaries of both the Sons and Auxiliaries of the Departments comprising this organization, definite information covering the time and place for the next annual meeting. In turn- the several Department Secretaries above mentioned shall relay this information to each and every Camp and Auxiliary in his or her respective Department.

All other correspondence, notices and literature pertaining to

this organization, shall be distributed in like manner.

CHAIRMAN OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Following election, the Board of Directors shall meet and select a member who shall act as Chairman of this Board. As such he will be responsible for all correspondence and reports wherein the Board of Directors may be involved.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The duties of the regular officers for this organization shall be those as properly devolve upon such officers, and within their respective scope and capacity.

The Board of Directors, or Council, shall be at all times closely identified with the regular officers of the organization as an advisory and general conference body, and a majority vote of same shall be required on all matters effecting the conduct and activities of the organization when same is not in annual sessions.

TIME AND PLACE OF ANNUAL MEETING

Time and place for the succeeding annual meeting may be decided by vote of the members present at, or near, the close of each annual meeting. In the event that time and place for the next annual meeting is not agreed upon as above permitted, then such selection shall be made by the President and the Board of Directors, and the Secretary shall be so advised
